

ast April 19, 2017, 48 participants coming from 15 different nations and different provinces and delegations of the Order of the Ministers of the Infirm met at Santa Fe Center, São Paulo, Brazil. They were gathered to share and reflect on the identity of the Camillian parishes as a place of "Koinonia, Diakonia, Kerygma." Frs. Jose Eloja, Gabriel Garcia, and Wilson Peñaranda represented the Philippine Province.

On the first day, Fr. Antonio Mendez Freitas, MI, gave his welcome address to the participants and presented the different aspects of the life and ministries of the province. Brazil was chosen to be the venue of this international meeting because it has the largest number of parishes—10 parishes that are taken care of. Aside from that, they have already the statute of the Camillian parishes that will be used in preparing the guidelines for parishes in our Order.

Fr. Leocir Pessini, MI, gave his address reflecting on the reason for the gathering. He looked at the parish ministry as a venue where we could exercise our charism because the people entrusted in the ministry are also wounded who need to be cared for. He also emphasized the importance of lay collaborators in this ministry and formation should be given to them so that the odor of Camillian charism can be smelled by people in the parish community.

Fr. Aris Miranda, MI, General Consultor for Ministry, presented to the body the flow of the meeting. There will be sharing of invited speakers, reflection and group sharing. He also explained the logo of the meeting: Koinonia, diakonia and kerygma embedded on each person with the Camillian red cross. This logo should be embed-

ded too in every Camillian parish to have its distinct character. He also added, "there are two images that may accompany the development of a 'Camillian

Installation and Commissioning of the Provincial Superior, Fr. Jose Eloja, MI

n May 1, 2017, Feast of St. Joseph the Worker, at the end of the first day of the Annual Retreat of the religious of the Camillian Philippine Province, was the installation and commissioning of the new Provincial Superior, Fr. Jose "Jojo" P. Eloja, MI. The mass and the installation was presided by Fr. Rolando J. Fernandez, MI, outgoing provincial who thanked all the religious for their collaboration and commitment during his term. In a special way, he underlined the great contributions of his councilors for their untiring commitment and great ideas: Fr. Evan Paul Villanueva, MI—Secretariat for Finance; Fr. Renante Sentillas, MI—Secretariat for Formation; Fr. Gabriel V. Garcia, MI—Secretariat for Ministry and Fr. Ruben Mandin, MI—Secretariat for Mission. Moreover, he expressed his confidence and assurance of God's abiding presence and wisdom to the new provincial.

The newly installed provincial, Fr. Jojo, later in the evening held his first ever audience in the form of a General Assembly with the religious in the Philippines. He expressed his guiding principles for his term as a provincial.

"Tenderness is not weakness; it is fortitude. It is the path of solidarity, the path of humility. Please, allow me to say it loud and clear: the more powerful you are, the more your actions will have an impact on people, the more responsible you are to act humbly. If you don't, your power will ruin you, and you will ruin the other. There is a saying in Argentina: 'Power is like drinking gin on an empty stomach.' You feel dizzy, you get drunk, you lose your balance, and you will end up hurting yourself and those around you, if you don't connect your power with humility and tenderness. Through humility and concrete love, on the other hand, power—the highest, the strongest one—becomes a service, a force for good." (Fr. 7天的海外醫療,在3/11歸國後平安落幕了!

還記得出發當天,一早即到醫院報到,做最後相關程序及醫療物品的確認後,一行人便在太陽的護送下浩浩蕩蕩前往目的地——菲律賓。

I remember the day that I reported to the medical team so early and made sure all related procedure and medical materials are done. Then, under the bright sunlight, we set off to the destination, "Philippines".)

休息了些許時間,我們在凌晨2點多集合改搭小型飛機趕往偏鄉僻壤,那裏的鄉民已經準備等著我們的到來……看到周圍的環境,大概是我們30年前的生活水平吧!沒有繁華都市的吵雜、沒有高樓大廈、沒有霓虹燈、也沒有汽車呼嘯而過;有的只是蟲鳴鳥叫、夜晚的星空閃亮亮、自己要去汲取需要的水……在準備就緒後,立即展開這次的任務,一點也不敢耽擱。

幾天下來,汗沒少流過,身是疲憊的,心是滿足的;被醫治的病患,從原本的滿面愁容到溢於言表的感激神情,一一盡收眼底,大家幾乎都會吵著要和醫療團隊合影,只是,這手邊的工作一放下,不知道又會耽誤到多少患者,就不敢貿然答應這樣的請求,最後只能在結束所有的事情之後,和大家「搏感情」。

(Took a breath, and we switched to a light aircraft bound for a rural area at 2 a.m. The residents there were waiting for our coming and, well, the surroundings were just like living standard 30 years ago in Taiwan, without the noise of prosperous urban, tall buildings, street lights or loud dense traffic, but the birds and insects chirping, starry night and water fetching by local method. We started our medical mission without hesitation immediately after all the things had been done.

Gone through these days, the crew sweated a lot and were so tired, but felt so satisfied. We saw many residents, who were cured, from frowning to smiles of appreciation, and almost everyone was eager to take pictures with the crew. However, we

could not delay our work on hand and excuse ourselves from yearning for taking photos for fear that the other patients might wait too long. Eventually, we finally had the chance to bond with the Philippine residents at the end of the work.)

Luckily, it was my stage to perform my private preference to car knowledge. Though I may not be good at holding the repair tools, I tried my best to put on the new tires as soon as possible in order not to waste too much time. I was not sure whether it was the rain or the sweat that soaked my back. Not only performed therapy for the patients, but also to the van.)

A Celebration of Life at 60



(Homily delivered by Fr. Ivo Anselmi, MI, at the Thanksgiving Mass for the 60th birthday anniversary of Fr. Rolando Fernandez, MI [April 29, 2017])

t's a great privilege to be here this evening, to celebrate this special occasion: the 60th birthday anniversary of our dear Fr. Rolly. And your presence here shows how much he means to all of us: relatives, confreres and friends. When I was preparing my homily for today, I asked different people what they thought I should talk about Fr. Rolly's 60th birthday anniversary. "Talk about his personality," someone told me. "Bring up the grace of his call to religious and priestly life," another person suggested. "You might go into the idea of highlighting his good achievements as a formator, financial administrator, provincial superior," someone said. But one of my friends who also knows Fr. Rolly very well, when I asked him what I should say, he thought for a moment. And then smiled, "Tell them," he said, "THAT HE IS A HAPPY PRIEST." There you have it. The shortest homily I could give on an evening like this. In five words: here is a happy priest!

But what marks his personality, I think, is more than just happiness. It's something wider and deeper: IT'S JOY.

I was thought by my novice master: "that joy is the most infallible sign of the presence of God." Knowing Fr. Rolly, working beside him all these years, I have seen it. And I agree. Joy brings us close to God, closer to his Holy Spirit, and a joyful priest magnifies that by bringing with that joy, a sense of the holy—a sense of God's grace at work. What a blessing that is!

But there is something else. Something deeply personal. Joy in Fr. Rolly's life comes from responsibility, a committed prayer life, a sense of sacrifice, love for our Order and something else. That something else is pure LOVE.

The joy of Fr. Rolly, the joy of every priest, is the joy of a man in love. In love with his vocation. In love with his people. In love with his God.

Look into the eyes of Fr. Rolly and you will see it. You will see someone who has found "that look of love in Christ."

Because the story of the priesthood is a love story. It is about falling in love with the God who loves you, and feeling that love so deeply, that you want to spend your life bringing it to others in the most simple but profound ways: in drops of water, in crumbs of bread, in the sign of the cross, in the confessional or at the bedside of the sick.



Being a priest means you love people and your faith so much that you want to bring Christ to them. Yes, being a priest is a love story.

And how blessed we have been because Fr. Rolly has been here for so many years to share that love story with us. We have been part of it. And he has been part

Dear Fr. Rolly, six long decades of life haven't slowed you down even a bit. You are happy, healthy and tremendously fit. Grace, dignity, maturity and wisdom—this is how I would describe your personality. But there is one quality that calls for special mention on the occasion of your birthday. It is the quality of fidelity. You have been faithful to the promises made to the Lord during your religious profession and priestly ordination!

Of course Fr. Rolly would be the last person to say that life has been all a bed of roses. Joy is the by-product of suffering and sacrifice. We all have had to tread our stony paths, yet as one writer had said so well: "If God sends us on a stony path, he also provides us with strong shoes." Fr. Rolly has walked through life in strong shoes and has successfully maneuvered many stony paths over the last 60 years. The prophet Jeremiah says the same thing in a challenging phrase: "it is good for a man to bear the yoke from youth to a buoyant old age." In this way we reach a nobility and a humanity, which is something more precious than gold.

Dear Fr. Rolly you have blessed so many lives through your faithful ministry. May you be blessed greatly in return on this special day.

On the occasion on your birthday we want to tell you how much you mean to our Camillian community. You truly exemplify what it means to serve as a faithful Camillian religious priest. Truly you can proudly say "I have crossed six decades of a very meaningful life."

However turning 60 maybe the beginning of the sunset period of your life. But don't be disheartened because sunsets are some of the beautiful spectacles. All you have to do is to sit back and enjoy the view.



OUR LADY OF LA PAZ PARISH: OLLP Lenten Pilgrimage

ilgrimage has been a part of our spiritual nourishment. We visit different churches and places not only to view the aesthetic structures of each church but more importantly it answers our yearning to be intimate with God and gives us a purer sense of His mercy and love. To make our pilgrimage more interesting Fr. Rodel Enriquez, MI, educated us about the history of each churches.

In the observance of the Lenten season, Our Lady of La Paz journeying as one community went on a Lenten pilgrimage in the different towns of Laguna. Incidentally, the Diocese of San Pablo is celebrating its Golden Jubilee, hence, the bishop declared a Holy Year of Thanksgiving and during this year, with the grant of Pope Francis, the faithful who will visit a jubilee church in the diocese can obtain plenary indulgence for themselves or for the souls in purgatory.

The first church that we visited was the Our Lady of the Pillar Parish in Alaminos, built in 1815. St. Joaquim was its first patron but because the image of the Blessed Virgin was miraculously found inside a well and

the many answered prayers of the faithful, the people made her their patroness to show their gratitude.

There was an ongoing Mass when we arrived so we prayed the 1st and 2nd Stations of the Cross outside the church where Fr. James led the prayer. After praying a Brother welcomed us.


The second church we visited was St. Paul the First Hermit in San Pablo founded in 1590 by the religious order of St. Augustine, better known as the Augustinians. Fr. Mateo Mendoza was its first parish priest. In 1749 its administration was ceded to the Franciscans. In 1967, with the erection of the Diocese of San Pablo, it gained the dignity of a Cathedral and is the Mother Church of all the Catholic churches and chapels in Laguna and San Pablo City. Fr. Gabby Garcia, MI, led the prayers for the 3rd and 4th Stations of the Cross. There was a wedding so we prayed in the patio. The weather was hot but the pilgrims did not mind. Afterwards we had picture taking.

The third church we visited was St. Bartholomew of the Apostle in Nagcarlan built in 1752 but was destroyed by fire in 1781. It was rebuilt in 1845 and had an architectural baroque style.

There was again a wedding so we prayed in a little chapel at the back. Fr. Rodel led the 5th, 6th and 7th Stations of the Cross.


Then the fourth church was St. John the Baptist in Liliw. The original structure was built in 1620 but a stronger stone church was built from 1643 to 1646 and was partially destroyed during the 1880 Luzon earth-

his was once again proven by the members of the Overseas Medical Mission Corps of St. Mary's Hospital/CADIS Taiwan from Luodong, Taiwan, during the joint Medical and Surgical Mission of St. Mary's Hospital and St. Camillus Hospital on March 6-8, 2017, in Calbayog City, Western Samar.

Led by Fr. Jose "Jojo" P. Eloja, MI, Team Taiwan, now on its third time of doing mission in the island of Samar, was composed of doctors (surgeons, neurologist, and general practitioner), nurses, pharmacists, social worker, dietician, and other volunteers. They were Chen Jen-Yong, Lin Guo-Bo with his wife Dr. Roselyn im, Chu Tung-Wei, Kao Yeh-Chan, Weng Ching-Yi, Lu Vlei-Lin, Lin Jui-Yu, Li Chih-Ying, Li Chang, Chi ChihHsien, Wu Yu-Ju, Lee Li-Chiu, Lin Jia-Duo, Yu Fang-Ling, and Hsu Yu-Yuan.

Fr. Jaime "James" A. Roa, MI, together with couple Drs. Arnel and Gina Angeles from St. Camillus Polyclinic in Brgy. La Paz, Makati City, also came over and extended their services during the mission held at St. Camillus Hospital Social Center, Brgy. Pilar, and Oquendo Poblacion.

Aside from the staff from St. Camillus Hospital, nurses coming from Calbayog City Health Office likewise helped in the 3-day activity which served a total of 1,121 senior citizens, persons with disability, adults, and pediatric patients.

quake. The most impressive feature of the church is the facade made of striking red bricks and adobe. An image of San Buenaventura sits at the center of the chapel. "In 1664, this image wept and sweated blood with Padre Juan Pastor and 120 witnesses."

We celebrated the Mass here and afterwards we had our picnic lunch. We were delayed on our way out because of the many pilgrims who also visited the place but that did not dampen the jovial mood we all

The fifth church was the St. Mary Magdalene Parish in Majayjay. The church was first built made of cogon and wood and was dedicated to Mary Magdalene. A permission to build a stone church was ordered in 1829. To secure funds for the building of the stone church, the people were obliged to pay taxes and dredge sand and stones from the river. The construction was halted in 1849 but was finished in 1855. The Filipino revolutionary leader General Emilio Jacinto sought refuge in the convent where his blood stains has been preserved and can still be seen.

Here we prayed the 8th, 9th and 10th Stations. Then the pilgrims looked around and bought souvenirs.

The sixth church we visited was the Diocesan Shrine of St. Anthony of Padua. It was built in 1578 and was

made only of bamboo and for 18 years the people of Pila helped out in building a church made of stone. It is said that it was the biggest and the most beautiful church in Laguna in those days. Fr. Oropesa was the first Parish Priest and received the first bell, a gift from the King of Spain in 1581. In July 9, 2002, the parish was elevated to Diocesan Shrine of St. Anthony of Padua. Here we prayed the remaining Stations of the Cross and afterwards took pictures and looked around.

The seventh and last church we visited was the Diocesan Shrine of St. Therese of the Child Jesus in UP Los Baños. A chapel was built in honor of St. Therese in 1927 with a seating capacity of 120 people. Since then, it became the unofficial university chapel. The parish was officially established under the Archdiocese of Lipa in 1958. Priests from the Society of Divine Word (SVD) administered the parish for 33 years. The present church with a seating capacity of 1,500 was built and blessed in 1971. In 2013, the relics of St. Therese visited the UPLB community as part of its world pilgrimage. The parish church was elevated to a Diocesan Shrine on Oct. 1, 2016. We were late in getting here because of the heavy traffic but nevertheless we had our final blessing. On our way home, despite of the heaviness of the traffic we all felt renewed and that we all were truly journeying as one community.

parish' in the modern times—being a 'field hospital after the battle,' and being an 'open hospital' for welcoming and caring the wounded. In this context, as Camillian religious we can depict ourselves at present as he 'Samaritan Camillians,' with the 'heart in their nands,' moving towards the existential peripheries of ife especially to the most needy."

On the second day, the meeting started with the relection of the Most Rev. Prosper Kontiebo, a Camillian 3ishop of Tenkodogo, Burkina Faso. His talk was cenered on the parish as a place of communion, evangeization and mission. He said "the Camillian religious who have parochial or diocesan pastoral responsibilities should remain Camillian in their mission, to live fully the charism in their respective assignment, and in forming communities, to live the spirit of St. Camillus who was ensitive to the suffering people and the needy." He also added: "Pope Francis says, the shepherd must emanate the smell of his sheep, and the sheep must emanate also the smell of their shepherd." He also said: beginning with the tension between the Camillian vocation and parochial pastoral commitment, we will try to show that managing a parish or a sanctuary by a Camilian religious is not a deformation of his vocation, but



another way of living the Camillian charism." It was reponded by Fr. Gabriel, a parish priest from Makati City, Philippines. He shared his experiences "in managing parish pastoral program with a commitment to integrate n a more structured was pastoral health care and animaion of service to the sick into the complex parish miniserial activity." After their talks, the group started their haring with questions: How can a Camillian religious vho has vowed to serve the sick even at risk of life, become an assistant parish priest or rector of a sanctuary and then a pastor and much more a bishop without be-




traying his vocation, his mission? How can you be a Camillian and parish priest? Is not a deformation or a vocational deviation? Does managing a parish or sanctuary really correspond to the Camillian charism? Then reporting followed. In our group, the sharing started with the question: How can we relate the charism of the Order to the young people? Our group started to exchange in answering the question as well as going through other reflections. Fr. Wilson, the reporter of the English-speaking group, reported the following: first, there are people working and sharing our charism because there are people who share our ministry in visiting and caring for the sick. The reason for this is that they are attracted with our charism. Second, we invite them to join us in living out our charism. Third, as our responsibility as Camillian, we have to train and catechize them the importance of serving the sick and in serving them we should respect their religion and belief. Fourth, we have to make them feel that they are also Camillian, engaged in serving the sick. Last, a call for personal witnessing as Camillian that lay people should see in us religious.


In the afternoon, Fr. Viceno Capozza and his two lay



collaborators of the Sicilian-Neapolitan province, present an experience of a "Camillian parish mission," a new model of witnessing the merciful love of Jesus Christ. "The role of the parish priest is to raise awareness of his person, his pastoral care to the same community towards the pastoral health and humanization of health. It is a moment of involving young people, families, and other members of the parish community who are formed and sensible to the theme of pain and suffering through sharing of their personal experiences, the celebration of the sacraments of healing and hope." After his talk, the different provinces started to present their respective parishes with it short history and describing its total context. This continued until the morning of the third day.

After the presentation on the third day, the rest of the day was intended on discussion about the statute of Camillian parishes of the Brazilian Province. The group tried to reflect and contextualize the said statute. The Archbishop of São Paulo, Cardinal Odilo Pedro Scherer, visited us during lunch. He made a short reflection on the importance of parish ministry and he was also grateful to the Camillian presence in the country.







After collating what we have shared, Fr. Gabriel presented to the body what we feel need to be revised in order that the statute would be applicable to all.

The fourth day was a break from the meeting. The group went on a pilgrimage to the shrine of Our Lady of Aparecida, Patroness of Brazil. It will be celebrating its 300 years foundation. The group practically stayed there for a day, celebrated the Mass, explored the place and bought some presents.

The concluding day was the presentation for the final drafting of the statute for Camillian parishes. It was presented by Fr. Aris. The body listened and clarified things about the statute. Before officially ending the meeting, some delegates gave their words of thanks to the Brazilian Province in general for the warm welcome and accommodations.

We ended the meeting with Eucharist presided over by the Superior General, Fr. Leocir.

The three of us left São Paulo fulfilled and convinced that we have done our part well in the meeting and it produced a document that will be beneficial to all parishes administered by the Camillians.

"Changing Children's Lives, One WISH at a Time"



ishes may come in many forms and may cost thousands of pesos. For people with a lot of excess money, granting their child's wish may seem just like a one-snap-of-a-finger kind of deal. But for others, it seems like reaching out for the stars in the sky. But what if the child making that wish is not their child? Then it just gets even nore harder to grant, some would think. But again, what if the child naking that wish is sick, not just with a simple fever but with something nore complex... maybe with something life-changing or something lifehreatening? Would it be easier for them to grant that child's wish?

Woodwater Center for Healing is one of the Centers put up by the Camillians—Rev. Fr. Rodolfo Vicente "Dan" Cancino Jr, MI, Rev. Fr. Eric Tampis, MI, and Rev. Fr. John Jay Magpusao, MI, in March 2011. It was easy to tell that our shoulders and backs were slouched but the smiles were wild because the whole crew felt so satisfied about the medical mission. These days, we tried our best to prepare the medical supplies or medical apparatuses. The crew may sometimes lack of consideration, but we had done what we could have done. In such a deficient countryside, even a wood plank could be the operating table, which is making the best possible use of material.)

這次海外醫療行收穫最大的是那些鄉民嗎?也許有吧!但我覺得自己獲得更多,那種可以用自己的力量去幫助別人,

心中滿滿的成就感,是無價,也是滿足的;而且,到過了醫療與環境不佳的地區,我更珍惜現在這眼前的一切!

(Looking back on the week in Philippines, I miss crowded, eager and passionate residents so much. The most impressive thing for me is that during the procedure to cut off the lipoma in headrest, due to lack of the medical device of radiofrequency ablation, the crew adopted manual compression instead. When we were about to deal with bleeding and nursing colleagues removed the oppression of the gauze, the red blood, like a small water fountain, sprayed so fast to the nursing colleagues, whose monotonous green clothes were dotted with red in all sizes. Through this lesson, the crew became more cautious to the treatment!

Is it the Philippine residents who had the biggest harvest this overseas medical mission? Maybe they had. However, I feel that I gained more. That I can use my own strength helping others, my heart is content with accomplishment, which is priceless, and also satisfied. Furthermore, having been to the region that is lacking of medical service and satisfactory living environment, I cherish all the things I have now!)
