LCF Pakistan on the Move to Preach the Gospel and Heal the Sick

n Oct. 22, 2017, on the occasion of the veneration of Our Lady of Mercy, a spiritual gathering was held in Our Lady of Mercy Parish, Chak 6/4-L, Okara, Pakistan. This parish belongs to the diocese of Faisalabad. Fr. Kamran Taj, the vicar general of the diocese, presided over the Holy Eucharist. Hun-

dreds of people from the neighboring villages and parishes came to participate.

On this day, the Lay Camillian Family-Pakistan, the lay collaborators, conducted a free medical mission that catered to 80 patients. Free medicines and diagnostic tests such as HCV, HBV, BSR, Typhoid test,

very local community shall promote Lay collaboration and to make efforts to establish the Lay Camillian Family (LCF) and to facilitate Camillian formation to members in ministering to the sick in the spirit of St. Camillus" (Statutes of the Philippine Province, no. 21). LCF is an association which gathers together people who feel called, as lay people, to live out their baptismal obligations, by witnessing to the Lord's love for the sick and the suffering, in accordance with the charism which St. Camillus de Lellis has received from God and transmitted to the Order he founded (LCF GS 1).

The Lay Camillian Family in New Zealand (NZ) and Australia were formally presented on Sept. 5 and 14, 2017, respectively, to their bishops. The bishops were also given a copy of the General Statutes of the LCF.

Almost two years of undergoing formation, the officers and members of the LCF in Auckland, New Zealand were installed on Sept. 3, 2017 in the chapel of Northshore Hospital. Two days later, LCF-NZ was formally presented to the bishop of Auckland diocese, Most Rev. Patrick Dunn, to be recognized in the diocese an Association of the Faithful. There is no known Camillian Kiwi in the history of the Order, and despite the absence of Camillian religious community in the country, the spirit of St. Camillus de Lellis is very much alive and active in this part of the world. Thanks to the initiatives of the three ex-Camillian seminarians, namely: Dennis Thomas Sañga, Aries Ortiz, and Oliver Café.

The Lay Camillian Family in Australia has been established in 2014 at Sacred Parish Westmead, NSW. But it was only presented formally to the bishop of Parramatta, Most Rev. Vincent Long Van Nguyen, last September 14. The members have been undergoing their formation and they have their regular ministerial and spiritual activities. One of their first major activities in the diocese of Parramatta was the sponsorship and organization of the celebration of the World Day of the Sick in the diocesan level. At the moment, some members are also helping out in putting up a foundation for Camillian Disaster Service (CADIS) Australia.

I would like to recognize and congratulate all the members of the Lay Camillian Family in the Philippine Province. Aside from the LCF Chapters 'Down Under' (Aus & NZ), there are also other active LCF groups in Pakistan, Taiwan, and the Philippines (a national assembly will be held on Nov. 24–26 at St. Camillus Pastoral Center, Quezon City). You are the arms and hands that St. Camillus wished to have so that more sick people can be reached out and served. I admire your dedication in loving and serving the sick. You have responded to the vocation that is rooted in the holiness infused into us at baptism and nourished in the Eucharist. I am grateful that in your response, you have chosen to share with us the mission of witnessing the compassion and merciful love of our Lord Jesus Christ towards the sick.

Since the Second Vatican Council the Church has called for a renewal in the life and role of lay people. In the documents of Vatican II and the writings of the Popes, especially St. John Paul II's *Christifideles Laici*, we can see that the laity holds a specific and unique vocation that they have to follow and fulfill so that the Church may grow and permeate the world. The Church teaches that the laity possesses a distinct and very real role in the spreading of the Gospel. I believe there are still many lay people who would like to be more involved in the life of the Church, but do not have a clear understanding of their role in the Church. Probably introducing them to the LCF may help.





POSTCARDS FROM TAIWAN

Camillians Recognized in Taiwan



ecognition was given to Camillian religious in Taiwan for their contribution to the development of Taiwan during the 75th anniversary of the diplomatic relations between the Vatican and the Republic of China (Taiwan).

In 1922 the Holy See sent Archbishop Celso Constantini to China as the first apostolic delegate of the country in which his principal function was to supervise the work of Catholic missionaries in the different parts of Mainland China.

In 1942 the diplomatic relations between the government of the Republic of China and the Holy See was officially established.

In 1949 with the birth of the Republic of China in Taiwan and the the popular People's Republic of China, two mutually independent regimes were established on Chinese territory. After the split and the turn of events, then Apostolic Delegate Archbishop Antonio Riberi, who was at that time in Nanjing Province, came to Taiwan in 1952 to begin his Apostolic Mission to the Republic of China. This was the origin of the actual diplomatic relations between the Holy See and the government of Taiwan.

In 1957, Beijing inaugurated the Patriotic Association of Chinese Catholics. This caused the disruption of the



economic and political relations with the Holy See, as well as in the doctrine and obedience to the Pope in Rome.

The Holy See exercises its sovereignty over the State of the Vatican City and has diplomatic relations with other members of the international community, 183 States to be exact. With the other 20 States, the Holy See is the only one in Europe that has full diplomatic relations with the Republic of China, officially called Taiwan.

The current Taiwanese ambassador to the Holy See Matthew S.M. Lee wanted to give a special meaning to the event and decided to select 10 religious congregations that have given a big contribution to the society of Taiwan. Among the chosen were the Camillians, represented by Fr. Giuseppe Didone, MI, who with some members of St. Mary's Hospital received the award on Oct. 5, 2017 in the sala magna of Pontificia Università Urbaniana.

On Oct. 10, 2017, the 106th National Day anniversary of the Republic of China in Taiwan, Fr. Giancarlo Michelini, MI, was also invited to attend the celebrations in the name of the Camillians.

From this year all foreign religious can receive Taiwanese citizenship for their significant contributions to Taiwanese society.

PILGRIMAGE TO SANTIAGO AND FATIMA

Ith some German friends, the Filipino Catholic Community under the Diocese of Essen, Germany went on pilgrimage to Santiago de Compostela (Galicia, Spain) and Fatima (Portugal) on Oct. 13–19, 2017 with Fr. Manny Tamayo, MI, as their spiritual adviser. It was very timely because this year celebrates the 100th year anniversary of Mama Mary's apparitions in Fatima to three shepherd children, namely, Jacinta, Francisco, and Lucia.

On Oct. 14 after breakfast, the pilgrims first went to the old town of Santiago with their tour guide, Diego. Here one cannot miss the imposing structure of the Cathedral of Santiago de Compostela, a World Heritage site. The entrance to the cathedral is called *Portico da Gloria*, which is an amazing art work. The pilgrims participated in the Pilgrim Trade Fair in the cathedral. They continued with their tour until around 5pm. They had dinner at *Hospederia San Martin Pinario*.

The next day, they attended the 7am Holy Mass in a chapel in the Cathedral. They left Santiago at 11am and took a boat ride on the Douro River to Porto, Portugal. They visited the Sandeman Port winery before heading to Hotel Fatima, where they were billeted. Later they joined the rosary torchlight procession.

On Oct. 16, they attended the Prayer of the Cross in

Aljustrel and joined in the celebration of the Eucharist at 10am in Stephanus Chapel. Then they visited the houses in a small village where the three young shepherds lived. At 3pm, they toured around the Shrine of Fatima: Peace Well, Chapel of Apparitions, the Basilica of the Most Holy Trinity. At 9:30pm, they participated in the rosary torchlight procession.

The following day they attended the Holy Mass in German language at the Shrine. Then they visited the Wax Museum and after which, they took the opportunity to go shopping for religious mementos and other products. Again at 9:30pm, they joined the torchlight procession.

On the penultimate day, they visited the monasteries in Batalha and Alcobaça and continued to Nazare, a well-known fishing village in the Atlantic Ocean. They attended the Holy Mass in the sanctuary on the site above Nazare. Back in the hotel, they had their devotional objects blessed in the hotel chapel. Later they joined the rosary torchlight procession.

With chaos around the world and man's seeming indifference towards one another, the events in Fatima constantly remind us to return to God's loving embrace and to be ever prayerful through the intercession of our Lady.


The LCF members use all their resources and connections from government facilities as well.

On Sept. 3, 2017 which also coincided with the celebration of Fathers' Day in New Zealand, the installation of the LCFNZ took place. After two years of formation, 12 were accepted to the Lay Camillian Family. The event was held at St. Luke's Chapel in Northshore Hospital, Auckland. After the installation, Msgr. David Tonks met with Frs. Jose and Marcelo and welcomed the LCF to his parish.

On Sept. 5, Frs. Jose and Marcelo together with LCFNZ officers met with Bishop Patrick at Pompallier Centre, Ponsonby, Auckland. The meeting started with introductions and sharing of the life of St. Camillus. History and works of the Order of the Ministers of the Sick as well as LCF worldwide were discussed. The group is set to establish a home base in St. Joseph's Parish in Takapuna and from there spread around Auckland and across New Zealand. A copy of the LCF handbook was also given to Bishop. With this, the organizational structure, formation and spirituality of the members were tackled. Bishop Patrick expressed his full support and blessings and commended the significant initiative. He said that having LCF will enliven the pastoral care apostolate in the parishes.

The two priests also took the opportunity to visit tourist destinations around North Island and Auckland City.

Before the end of the visit, Fr. Marcelo expressed that he will be coming to New Zealand twice a year to welcome new members and to provide continuous pastoral support to the group.

The seed planted by Fr. Evan Paul Villanueva, MI, in September 2015, has grown and is now ready to bear fruit.

SCCS 32nd Foundation Anniversary and English Week Culmination

n Sept. 22, 2017, St. Camillus College Seminary held its annual celebration of its Foundation Anniversary and the culmination of its English Week. Now on its 32nd year as an institution, SCCS continues in its thrust toward education that is geared in the knowledge, love and service of Christ especially in the sick. The daylong activity was not just a welcome break from the regular academic endeavors of students. It was also a way of showcasing their talent as artists each in their own way. The event was made all the more special because it was the first time that the Grade 11 students would be participating in the activity with the rejigged Seminary and College administration.

The daylong activity was of two halves. The first half was scheduled from 8:30 to 10:00am; the second half took place from 1:30 to 3:15pm. The celebration started with a prayer led by Sem. Edgar B. Basas who prayed St. Mother Teresa of Calcutta's "Anyway." It was followed by the singing of the National Anthem conducted by Sem. Kyrb Del Darrel Veronilla. The program proper started with the opening remarks by the new Dean of Studies, Dr. Manuel B. Dy, Jr. He recalled fond memories that he had in learning the English language. His experience was not an easy one owing to a provincial backdrop but it proved to be very important in the course of his life, then as a student and now as an educator. Dr. Dy also bared that it was Fr. Ivo Anselmi, MI, the founder of SCCS, who personally invited him at his home in Kingsville to teach in the College Seminary. Owing to commitments with Ateneo de Manila University (ADMU) and a heavy teaching load, he declined at that time but eventually accepted the offer in 2005. Dr. Dy ended his opening remarks with the challenge of "continuing to live out our vocation and using it to shape our future."

The next part of the program was the modified Spelling Bee contest. It was modified because instead of sending selected participants per batch, as was usually done, the whole batches were made to join instead. It was made possible by assigning numbers to every student; some had up to three numbers. The points earned were by class but the presentation of the word for every number was individual (by number). The methods were employed to guarantee full participation and to gauge individual student proficiency in spelling. Students either pumped fists in triumph or groaned in dismay after trying to spell out words such as ganache, plummet, largess/ largesse, queue, coquette, and tête-à-tête. The Spelling Bee was followed by an intermission number by the Grade 11 students who sang "One Day" by Matisyahu, a Jewish American reggae vocalist, beatboxer and alternative rock singer. They rendered the song very beautifully that it drew applause from the very appreciative crowd. Afterwards, the masters of ceremony introduced the judges for the various contests: Declamation, Choral Presentation (Speech Choir), Mr. Literary Pageant 2017 and Dress Your Door. The judges were Ms. Jaila Marcella M. Guillermo and Ms. Jessica T. Macaraeg of the University of the Philippines and Prof. Jose Paulo Justiniano





from ADMU, who is also an alumnus of SCCS. In the Declamation contest, the piece selected portrays events relevant to today's situation of extrajudicial killings. The participants were Sem. Romeo Partoza Jr. (Grade 11), Sem. Ervic Villamor Jr. (2nd year), Sem. Edgar Basas Jr. (3rd year) and Sem. Osben Pantorilla (4th year). Each delivered the piece with his own uniqueness but ultimately pointed out to the severe injustice with which the country bleeds with right now. The heart-rending performances were followed by an intermission number by the 4th year students who wowed the crowd with the song "Two Less Lonely People" by Air Supply. With that, the morning program ended and a 30-minute break started in preparation for the Holy Mass. During the break, the judges went to every seminary classroom to admire and grade the adorned doors while the students busied themselves with preparations for the Mass and for the afternoon events.

The Holy Mass began at 11:00am. The celebrant and homilist was Rev. Fr. Ruben Mandin, MI, the new seminary rector. In his homily, he emphasized the importance of recognizing under which banner we fight for in our daily lives in reference to St. Ignatius' description with regards to standards. He said that in enrolling oneself to the company of Jesus, it is important to embrace the values of the Kingdom. In so doing, one must imitate Christ's spiritual poverty, humility and capacity to accept insults for the sake of the kingdom. He concluded with an emphasis on the actualization of these precepts in the life of St. Camillus who worked for the bodily needs of people. "Be Christ to the sick: seek Christ in the sick."

Lunch (salu-salo) was served in the refectory of the seminary after the Mass. A photo booth was also set up for those who wanted to take a memorabilia of the event—which the students were foremost to do so.

The second half of the program began at 1:30pm. It started with the Choral Reading Contest where each year level took part. For optimal judging, all read the same



piece—Edgar Allan Poe's "The Raven," which emphasizes on eternal mourning and remembrance. The contest was followed by an intermission number by the 4th year students and two trivia questions. The first question was: "What is the full name of Ate Babes?" while the second one was: "When did the Ministry of Education officially grant recognition of SCCS?" The answers were Aurelia C. Silva and Sept. 24, 1985, respectively. The next part of the afternoon program was the Mr. Literary Pageant 2017. Each year level had one participant. The candidates were garbed to resemble literary characters. The Grade 11 representative was Sem. Shan Rey Manahon, dressed as a casual college sophomore to resemble the character Keiichi Morisato, which is taken from the manga-anime series Oh My Goddess! by Kosuke Fujishima. For his part, 2nd year representative Sem. Ivan Rey Etor, clad in dignified-godlike fashion, chose the epic Greek god of the sea Poseidon, whom one may find in several masterpieces of fiction from Homer's Odyssey to Rick Riordan's Heroes of Olympus and Percy Jackson and the Olympians book series. Sem. Marlou Aguilar of the Juniors' "Behold the banana!," meanwhile, brought the house down to peals of laughter with his imitation of the witty and quirky Capt. Jack Sparrow from the Pirates of the Caribbean franchise by Jerry Bruckheimer with reference to Walt Disney's theme park ride of the same name. Seniors' participant and author Sem. Robert Jan Panizales chose to portray





Robert Louis Stevenson's irksome dual personality protagonist-antagonist, Dr. Henry Jekyll, from a novella entitled The Strange Case of Dr. Jekyll and Mr. Hyde. Each of the participants was asked a question mostly related to patriotism and society. After the last participant had answered, the judges were then presented with tokens of appreciation. It was followed by an intermission number by the 3rd year students who sang the song "Thank You" in remembrance and heartfelt gratitude to the families, benefactors, friends and college administration who have continually extended their time, talents and efforts for the progress of SCCS throughout the 32 years of its continuing service. Subsequently, awards were given to students who were included in the Dean's List and for those who topped the various events. Dr. Estrelita Madriaga and Fr. Ruben handed the certificates of academic excellence. Sems. Jonathan Neil Tayco, Marlou Aguilar and Reynald Lismoras topped the Dean's List for the 1st, 2nd and 3rd years, respectively, last AY 2016-2017 2nd semester.

Afterwards, Sem. Lance Rosario, Chairman of the Languages Circle and Mr. Paulo Justiniano gave the awards to the winning participants in the various contests. The

spelling bee contest was won by the 4th year with the 3rd year as second-placer. The two winners exchanged places in the Dress Your Door contest as the 3rd year's door proved more gorgeously done and won first place than the 4th year's at second place. The Choral presentation was won by the Seniors while the Sophomores placed second. The Mr. Literary 2017 was won by Sem. Robert Jan Panizales as Dr. Henry Jekyll; Sem. Marlou Aguilar as Capt. Jack Sparrow placed second.

The daylong activity was formally ended with the closing remarks by Prof. Fe de Jesus, the Languages Circle Adviser. She invited everyone to go back to the basics and rediscover the beauty in reading. It is one of the avenues where one experiences the value of language—particularly the English language. The language itself is a reminder of times long past, of dreams yet to be fulfilled or already abandoned, of learning yet to be relived. Through reading we grasp the language more firmly and learn, dream and travel all at the same time despite being physically confined to some particular place and time. The English language is, as the theme of the celebration suggests, A Language to Celebrate the Past and Shape the Future.

n line with the Year of the Parish as Communion of Communities and in response to the call of Pope Francis to bring the church to the community, our parish has begun a Basic Ecclesial Community wherein the objectives are to deepen the association between church and community and find out what the community needs the most and give an effective response to it.

Simple experience though it maybe but the learnings I got from the home visitations made me realize that community problems can only be solved by the community itself, by us! If we only learn to care for everyone in our neighborhood and not just for our family, if we put love in everything we do, then, maybe the peace and changes that we are seeking for might be just around the corner.
