Balugo is one of the barangays of the municipality of Sibulan in the province of Negros Oriental, Philippines. Sibulan is bordered to the south by the provincial capital of Dumaguete City. For over 30 years, Balugo has been home to the Camillian missionary, Fr. Thomas 'Tom' Welu.

On Nov. 20, 2017, Fr. Jose Eloja, Fr. Rodel Enriquez, and Fr. Gabriel Garcia, had the chance to visit Fr. Tom in Balugo. Fr. Tom prepared a tarpaulin with the names of the three confreres written on it to welcome them. The banner made it easy for them to find the location in the wide mountainous area. When they arrived, Fr. Tom was sitting in front of the old clinic where he patiently waited





guests updated Fr. Tom about what is happening in the Province since the new administration took over. Fr. Tom also shared his simple life-experience especially as a missionary for many years in Balugo. Now that he has retired from active missionary work in the clinic and in the church, he still wants to stay in Balugo because he loves so much the people there and the place itself. He even wants to be buried beside the church that he built in that barangay.

From the humble beginnings, the church building that Fr. Tom founded, with the help of the local folks and funding from his benefactors overseas especially from the US, is now a beautiful concrete church building. It is just more

ime flies very quickly. It seems as if it was only yesterday that we entered the year 2017 and yet, whether we are prepared or not, the year 2018 is ushered in! We give thanks to the almighty God by whose guidance and protection has brought us thus far.

As we come to the end of the Christmas season and resolutions and planning for the New Year are set in motion, the usual practice of looking back on the year is once again a worthy thing to do. We may also look back on ourselves, be it as individuals or as a community, recollecting and evaluating our performance in the light of our Christian life and mission.

It is worth mentioning some highlights in the Province during the year 2017. The Province entered the year with the inauguration and blessing of the Br. Renato Marinello Memorial Building in Luodong, Taiwan. Held on Jan. 21, the occasion was graced by the Papal Chargé d'affaires, Msgr. Sladan Cosic; Superior General, Fr. Leocir Pessini; Provincial Superior, Fr. Rolando Fernandez; and two other guest-Camillians from Italy and Thailand, Fr. Mario Didone and Fr. Giovanni Contarin, respectively. Another major event that occurred in the Province was the Extraordinary Provincial Chapter held on Feb. 6-10 at St. Camillus Pastoral Care Center, Loyola Heights, Quezon City. A total of 24 representatives from Indonesia, Australia, Taiwan, and Philippines participated as capitulars. Then on April 10, the Superior General, Fr. Leocir Pessini, appointed me as Provincial Superior of the Philippine Province. My inauguration and commissioning as new Provincial Superior was held on May 1 (feast of St. Joseph the worker) at St. Scholastica's Retreat Center in Tagaytay City during the annual retreat of the Camillian religious in the Philippines. With the election of the new set of Provincial Councilors on the same month, the term of the new Provincial administration has begun. In the following month, the new set of Delegation Council in Taiwan was appointed.

Last May 23, the dialysis center at St. Camillus Med-

ical Center in Pasig City was inaugurated. Then on the feast day of St. Camillus, the new Theologate house in (Maumere) Flores, Indonesia was also inaugurated. In the same month, the Province was blessed with the ordination to the priesthood of two Vietnamese religious assigned in Taiwan and with the perpetual profession of one religious in the Philippines who also got ordained deacon a week after. Around this period, the reshuffling of assignments of the religious and the installation of local superiors also took place.

During the spring season in the countries down under, two important events also occurred. In New Zealand, the recognition and induction of officers of the Lay Camillian Family was held in the chapel of North Shore Hospital on Sept 3. Two days later, the LCF-NZ was formally presented to the bishop of the Diocese of Auckland. Then a few days later in Australia, the established Lay Camillian Family was also formally presented to the bishop of the Diocese of Parramatta. On Nov. 24–26, the different chapters of LCF in the Philippines held a national convention wherein a new set of national officers was elected.

Recently, the Provincial and the Provincial Councilors had a meeting with the local superiors of the different religious communities in the Philippines. Then on the following day (Dec. 9), the General Assembly and the Christmas party of the religious in the Philippines was held. All these were just some of the important events that happened in the Province. There were still many other events and things that we have to thank God for.

I would like also to seize the opportunity to thank everyone who put in so much efforts in order for us to celebrate the events appreciably. I personally thank the confreres for their cooperation wherever they are in the past year and I hope the same or even better continues in the year 2018. Let us continue to be challenged to bring Christ and his love, mercy and compassion to the sick.


ON the occasion of the "World Stroke Day" last Oct. 29, 2017, our 50 seminarians participated in a seminar on Stroke and High

CAMILLIAN FORMATORS' MEETING



he International Meeting of Camillian Formators and Vocation Animators held last Oct. 12–18, 2017 in Rome, Italy was attended by about 50 delegates representing 41 countries around the world. Among the attendees were confreres from the Philippine Province, namely, Fr. Angel Crisostomo; Fr. Wilson Peñaranda; Fr. Henry Angupa II (Taiwan Delegation); and Fr. Alfons Oles (Indonesian Delegation).

The conference's primary objective was "to achieve an updating and revitalization of our visions, actions and instruments in the field of the promotion of vocations and Camillian formation."

In keeping up with the present realities and needs in formation houses, the organizers under the Secretariat for Formation called forth the meeting to update the Rules of Formation of the Order, which was one of the specific objectives.

Keynote speakers were Fr. Pascual Chavez Villanueva, SDB, a former Superior General of the Salesians of Don Bosco and Fr. Matthew Vattamattam, CMF, current Superior General of the Claretian congregation.

Fr. Pascual talked about "Young People and Consecrated Life Today," the so-called millenials and how they are different now from older generations.

Fr. Matthew, on the other hand, spoke about "Vocational Discernment in an Intercultural World."

When asked for reactions or reflections about the conference, Fr. Angel has these to say:

- Time is a constraint in reviewing all articles of formation. That is why all participants were grouped into 5 (according to spoken language) and divided among themselves the 100 plus articles on formation for discussion, review and proposed amendments. Assigned to his group were Formation on Temporary Professed.
- When all confreres do things together, that is "very religious." While the articles can be updated by experts on Canon Law and Formation and just cascade them down to the formation houses, instead the confreres painstakingly tackled and discussed each article. And the humility there is that

- "we cannot really solve everything because after all, God is the ultimate formator."
- 3. The youth of today need "accompaniment." While many say millenials today are lazy and selfish with a sense of entitlement, it is not their fault as they were brought up that way by their families. But as one speaker said, this generation's youth upholds what is fair and just, and wants to be closer to God, so they need spiritual direction.
- 4. There should be preparation or training for formators.
- Interculturality is a grace where "there is no superior culture over any other culture, but what you have can enrich the ideal community." However, egocentricity can be a hindrance to interculturality.

Tom's coming to this community and opening of that clinic was the introduction of anti-malaria program. The cases of malaria in that community reduced drastically over the years.

Fr. Jojo, Fr. Rodel, and Fr. Gabby were really grateful for the opportunity to visit Fr. Tom and to see what he has done in the community of Balugo. Certainly, there were still many stories that Fr. Tom would like to share had time only permitted. Other stories had been written already in the dearly missed Balugo Baloney corner of this newsletter. FROM THE VATICAN

MESSAGE OF HIS HOLINESS POPE FRANCIS TO THE PARTICIPANTS IN THE 32nd INTERNATIONAL CONFERENCE ON THE THEME: "ADDRESSING GLOBAL HEALTH INEQUALITIES" [NEW SYNOD HALL, 16-18 NOVEMBER 2017]

To My Venerable Brother Cardinal Peter Kodwo Appiah Turkson Prefect of the Dicastery for Promoting Integral Human Development

I offer a cordial welcome to the participants in the Thirty-second International Conference on the theme Addressing Global Health Inequalities. I express my gratitude to all those who have worked to organize this event, in particular, to the Dicastery for Promoting Integral Human Development and the International Confederation of Catholic Health Care Institutions.

Last year's Conference took note of encouraging data on the average life expectancy and on the global fight against pathologies, while at the same time pointing out the widening gap between the richer and poorer countries with regard to access to medical products and health-care treatment. Consequently, it was decided to address the specific issue of inequalities and the social, economic, environmental and cultural factors underlying them. The Church cannot remain indifferent to this issue. Conscious of her mission at the service of human beings created in the image of God, she is bound to promote their dignity and fundamental rights.

To this end, the New Charter for Health Care Workers states that "the fundamental right to the preservation of health pertains to the value of justice, whereby there are no distinctions between peoples and ethnic groups, taking into account their objective living situations and stages of development, in pursuing the common good, which is at the same time the good of all and of each individual" (No. 141). The Church proposed that the right to health care and the right to justice ought to be reconciled by ensuring a fair distribution of healthcare facilities and financial resources, in accordance with the principles of solidarity and subsidiarity. As the Charter notes, "those responsible for healthcare activities must also allow themselves to be uniquely and forcefully challenged by the awareness that 'while the poor of the world continue knocking on the doors of the rich, the world of affluence runs the risk of no longer hearing those knocks, on account of a conscience that can no longer distinguish what is human'" (No. 91; Caritas in Veritate, 75).

I am pleased to learn that the Conference has drafted a project aimed at concretely addressing these challenges, namely, the establishment of an operational platform of sharing and cooperation between Catholic health care institutions in different geographical and social settings. I willingly encourage those engaged in this project to persevere in this endeavour, with God's help. Healthcare workers and their professional associations in particular are called to this task, since they are committed to raising awareness among institutions, welfare agencies and the healthcare industry as a whole, for the sake of ensuring that every individual actually benefits from the right to health care. Clearly, this depends not only on healthcare services, but also on complex economic, social, cultural and decision-making factors. In effect, "the need to resolve the structural causes of poverty cannot be delayed, not only for the pragmatic reason of its urgency for the good of society, but because society needs to be cured of a sickness which is weakening and frustrating it, and which can only lead to new crises. Welfare projects, which meet certain urgent needs, should be considered merely temporary responses. As long as the problems of the poor are not radically resolved by rejecting the absolute autonomy of markets and financial speculation and by attacking the structural causes of inequality, no solution will be found for the world's problems or, for that matter, to any problems. Inequality is the root of social ills." (Evangelii Gaudium, 202).

I would like to focus on one aspect that is fundamental, especially for those who serve the Lord by caring for the health of their brothers and sisters. While a well-structured organization is essential for providing necessary services and the best possible attention to human needs, healthcare workers should also be attuned to the importance of listening, accompanying and supporting the persons for whom they care.

In the parable of the Good Samaritan, Jesus shows us the practical approach required in caring for our suffering neighbour. First, the Samaritan "sees". He notices and "is moved with compassion" at the sight of a person left stripped and wounded along the way. This compassion is much more than mere pity or sorrow; it shows a readiness to become personally involved in the other's situation. Even if we can never equal God's own compassion, which



fills and renews the heart by its presence, nonetheless we can imitate that compassion by "drawing near", "binding wounds", "lifting up" and "caring for" our neighbour (cf. Lk 10:33-34).

Ahealthcare organization that is efficient and capable of addressing inequalities cannot forget that its raison d'être, which is compassion: the compassion of doctors, nurses, support staff, volunteers and all those who are thus able to minimize the pain associated with loneliness and anxiety.

Compassion is also a privileged way to promote justice, since empathizing with the others allows us not only to understand their struggles, difficulties and fears, but also to discover, in the frailness of every human being, his or her unique worth and dignity. Indeed, human dignity is the basis of justice, while the recognition of every person's inestimable worth is the force that impels us to work, with enthusiasm and self-sacrifice, to overcome all disparities.

Finally, I would like to address the representatives of the several pharmaceutical companies who have been invited to Rome to address the issue of access to antiretroviral therapies by paediatric patients. I would like to offer for your consideration a passage of the New Charter for Healthcare Workers. It states: "Although it cannot

be denied that the scientific knowledge and research of pharmaceutical companies have their own laws by which they must abide—for example, the protection of intellectual property and a fair profit to support innovation = ways must be found to combine these adequately with the right of access to basic or necessary treatments, or both, especially in underdeveloped countries, and above all in the cases of so-called rare and neglected diseases, which are accompanied by the notion of orphan drugs. Health care strategies aimed at pursuing justice and the common good must be economically and ethically sustainable. Indeed, while they must safeguard the sustainability both of research and of health care systems, at the same time they ought to make available essential drugs in adequate quantities, in usable forms of guaranteed quality, along with correct information, and at costs that are affordable by individuals and communities" (No. 92).

I thank all of you for the generous commitment with which you exercise your valued mission. I give you my Apostolic Blessing, and I ask you to continue to remember me in your prayers.


ovenight stay in Camp John Hay. The silver jubilarians presented a song number that was their batch song when they were still studying in SCCS.
